

Camp Wanapitei Cabins: Maki House, Red Squirrel, Hospital

The individual fee for overnight use of our cabins is \$65/person/night (\$50 for Red Squirrel).

Groups of 4 or more are billed at \$50/person/night (\$35 for Red Squirrel).

Additional cost for **snow mobile transport** of people and gear into the site from Red Squirrel Road or from the Mine Landing in Temagami = \$40 per trip. Each trip can take 4 people plus gear.

Cabin Setup

Each cabin is equipped with pots, pans, dishes, and cutlery. A wood stove is used for warmth. A propane stove is used for cooking (in Maki House and the Hospital – Red Squirrel does not have cooking facilities – visitors bring their own camp stove). Wanapitei supplies wood and propane for each cabin. Visitors supply their own bedding (sleeping bag and pillow) and towels.

Beds – Maki House

Maki House has 8 single beds in the form of bunk beds. Mattresses are supplied

Beds – Hospital

The Hospital has 1 double bed, 1 bunk bed (with 2 singles) and 1 single box bed. Mattresses are supplied.

Beds – Red Squirrel

The Red Squirrel has 12 single beds in the form of bunk beds. Mattresses are supplied.

Heat & Wood

The cabins are remote and only partially insulated. Wood is supplied at each cabin. Stove ash is shoveled into the metal bucket for disposal.

Cooking

A propane stove is supplied for cooking (in Maki House and the Hospital). Our site manager will turn the valve on for visitors on their arrival at camp.

Drinking Water

Obtain water from the lake or river. You can use an axe to open a hole in the ice. We recommend chemically treating your drinking water. Bring chemical treatment tablets/liquid or your own water filter.

Food

We suggest that you bring foods that are easy to prepare and light to carry. Avoid bringing cans and bottles. Remove unnecessary food packaging before heading to Wanapitei and try to pack bulk foods in reusable plastic containers.

Outhouse

Toilet paper is stored in the outhouse. **MEN** – Please do not pee just anywhere outside the cabin. Doing so is unsightly. Please walk away from the cabin and to a discreet location.

Snow in the Cabin

Please sweep up the snow tracked into the cabin, and that gets in the door jam so it doesn't melt and later freeze. There is a broom and dustpan provided at each cabin.

Dogs

Trail users with dogs **MUST** clean up after their pets. If your dog poops on the trail, scoop it up and toss into the bush. At the cabins, deposit poop in the outhouse.
